Sermon Notes

Extraordinary Boldness in Ordinary People

Acts 4: 1-31 (pew Bible pgs. 911-912)

In chapter one of the book of Acts, we saw the risen Christ make a promise and give a commission to his disciples before he ascended into heaven. In chapter two, we saw the promise fulfilled at Pentecost as the Holy Spirit filled the disciples and the power of the gospel was unleashed and the Church was born. In Acts chapter three, we saw the inevitable overflow of the Holy Spirit as the Spirit-filled church goes out into a dark and hurting city and the risen, ascended Christ continues His work through that community of faith.

Today, we come to Acts chapter four. After a dramatic healing and powerful sermon, we see the inevitable conflict between light and dark as the church faces persecution for the first time. Persecution is an inevitable element of genuine Christian faith. The gospel never progresses unopposed. It is the pattern we will see through Acts and throughout Church history: the outpouring of the Holy Spirit leads to extraordinary advances of God's kingdom, leading to the hostile opposition from the enemies of God. Jesus told his disciples this would happen. He promised to give them the power and words they needed to boldly face this opposition. His promise is for us today.

The Inevitable Confrontation (Acts 4: 1-4)

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The Bold Proclamation (Acts 4: 5-12)

'How did you do this – by what name did it happen?' is the question that comes to Peter and John. The answer comes with boldness and clarity. "Be it known to you all," Peter says, "that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead, by him this man is standing before you well." The one you crucified God raised and made the Cornerstone of his kingdom. He is the only Savior. "There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved."

The Fearful Intimidation (Acts 4: 13-22)

The authorities of the court are unable to deny a great miracle has taken place. Neither can they dispute the claim of Peter and John that the healing was done through the power of Jesus. Concerned that this 'Jesus Movement' could quickly get out of hand, they try to contain it. But all they can do is threaten and intimidate and command Peter and John to stop saying the name of Jesus. The disciple's answer rings true for us today: "we cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard."

The Bold Intercession (Acts 4:23-31)

When the disciples came back, they told the church of the threats they received. Everyone understood the implication: persecution or worse. So, did they flee back into hiding? No, they prayed for boldness! In answer to prayer, fear melted away and they received a fresh filling of the Holy Spirit and renewed boldness to keep proclaiming the name of Jesus.
