Sermon Notes

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The Danger of Self-deception

Matthew 7:21-23 (pew Bible pg. 812)

"Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 7:21)

The goal of today's sermon is not to bother you, or put unnecessary fear in you, or cause you to doubt the reality of your relationship with Christ. But, if the words of Jesus bother you, or put a healthy fear in you, or cause you to seriously examine the basis of your faith claim, then let them. That is a good thing! The words of Christ in this closing portion of the Sermon on the Mount are "designed to put the fear of God in us about our moral condition". (McKnight)

Today's sermon text is a sobering passage that contains a serious warning about the danger of being deceived. Jesus aims His words at our hearts and shines His holy light into our souls and demands we take an honest look at what is revealed.

The good news of God's glorious gospel is that He is willing to give us this opportunity. The Sermon on the Mount shows us what Jesus requires of us; what it means to do "the will of my Father who is in heaven". Jesus expects us to *hear* His words and *do* them (Matt 7:24). Again, the good news of God's glorious gospel is that what God requires of us in the Sermon on the Mount He purchases for us and accomplishes in us through Christ. So, the clear warning about self-deception is for our good. It is for our salvation. It is for our flourishing. Today, let the Spirit of God use this passage as He would to do a good work in your soul.

Words alone, even the right words, are not sufficient to save.

Activities alone, even extraordinary activities, are not evidence of saving faith.

Obedience alone; this is the essential characteristic of the genuine disciple.
