**Righteous are you, O LORD** 

Psalm 119: 137-144 [Tsadhe]

Tsadhe **137** Righteous are you, O LORD, and right are your rules. **138** You have appointed your testimonies in righteousness and in all faithfulness. **139** My zeal consumes me, because my foes forget your words. **140** Your promise is well tried, and your servant loves it. **141** I am small and despised, yet I do not forget your precepts. **142** Your righteousness is righteous forever, and your law is true. **143** Trouble and anguish have found me out, but your commandments are my delight. **144** Your testimonies are righteous forever; give me understanding that I may live. Psalm 119:137–144

The Urban Dictionary defines 'righteous' as "containing the best possible attributable qualities." Another definition describes it as "acting in accord with moral law". A reasonable question would be who determines what is the "best possible attribute"? Who decides whether or not someone or something is "in accord with moral law"? Who decides what is moral? Today, more than ever, the answer to this question is, well..... in question.

The Bible has the answer for these questions. Several times in Psalm 119 the writer has said, "give me understanding". (vv 27,34,73, 125,144) This understanding is gained as we grow in our knowledge of God. To know God better is to know His character, to know His attributes. Stanza "Tsadhe" zeros in on one of these divine attributes: God's righteousness. Some form of the word occurs 6 times in theses 8 verses. These verses tell us about the righteousness of God, the righteousness of his word, and the way we should respond to these truths.

Our Righteous God: Righteous are you, O LORD

His Righteous Word: *right are your rules* 

Our Right Response: *give me understanding that I may live*

As we have been confronted several times now with the Psalmist's desire for understanding. How has this study shaped your understanding of understanding? (c) How would you define biblical understanding?
