A Compelling Vision of Christ in His Church

Revelation 1:9-20

A "study in the book of Revelation" often leads us to think of events yet to come. Since it is an apocalyptic book, Revelation is a stunning and strange unveiling of future events, filled with symbolism and scenes that confuse and confound us. But Revelation is not just about the future. Like every part of Scripture, Revelation is given *"for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness"* (2 Timothy 3:16). Through Revelation God intended to bless, comfort and encourage his people in every generation to be faithful and persevere in every circumstance, in every culture, in everything.

The whole book, in one way or another, is about Jesus. At three strategic points in the book of Revelation we see a dramatic heavenly vision of Christ. Toward the end of the book, he is the King of kings who is coming again (19:11-21). Earlier in Revelation, he is the warrior Lamb sitting on the throne of heaven (5:5-14). Today in chapter one, we see the first supernatural glimpse into the invisible spiritual realm. It is a compelling vision of Christ moving in his church, a vision of Jesus that is as needed today as it was for John and those first century Christians. Today Jesus stands within his church to confront us, to steady us, to assure us, and to give us boldness to live for him.

John – Our Faithful Brother and Companion in the Kingdom (Rev 1:9)

John – The Faithful Prophet Hearing the Call and Commission of God (Rev 1:10)

Jesus – The Son of Man Present and Powerful Within His Church (Rev 1:11-16)

Jesus – The Living One Comforts and Commissions His Church (Rev 1:17-20)
