Sermon Notes

The Seventh Trumpet

Revelation 11:15-19

Then the seventh angel blew his trumpet, and there were loud voices in heaven, saying, "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ, and he shall reign forever and ever." (Revelation 11:15)

Ever since Jesus' disciples asked him to teach them to pray, followers of Christ have prayed, "Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven" (Matthew 6:10). Today's passage announces the ultimate answer to that prayer.

Revelation 11:15 is at the center of the Book of Revelation, both in where it falls in the text and what it proclaims. It announces the eternal rule and reign of "our Lord and his Christ". The King is enthroned, and his reign will never end. With the blast of the seventh trumpet, heaven and earth are hearing God say, "it is finished! God has reclaimed his creation and his eternal kingdom is established. The language used here is known as prophetic past tense. These words were written twenty centuries ago, but they are certain – they are sure! The prophecies of David and Daniel (Psalm 2 & Daniel 2) have been fulfilled! Even though there is more to come in Revelation, and more to come in God's redemptive plan, it is as good as accomplished.

Revelation 11: 15-19 was the theme of the Hallelujah Chorus in the second part of Handel's Messiah. It should be the theme of our lives as well.

How do we see the "already but not yet" nature of Jesus' cry of "it is finished" through the Scriptures? How does this idea help us understand who we are as exiles? How does it define our role here?

Read Jeremiah 29:7 together. How does the fullness of the gospel and its implications help us define the word "welfare" there?
