A Vision of the New Jerusalem Revelation 21:9-27

When it comes to the return of Christ and the Kingdom he will consummate, we want to know details! This is true of the description John offers us from his vision in Revelation 21. We hear measurements and gates and jewels and inscriptions, and we immediately try to gain a vision of what this place will look like one day. This is a good thing, because out of our longing for heaven naturally grows a longing to understand all that heaven will be like. But, as James Hamilton writes in his commentary on Revelation, John's description is "meant to be overwhelming in proportion, and it is, but we're not intended to try to make it into a blueprint." The vision of Revelation 21 is not intended to grant us a tangible view of this new city, but rather to cast our gaze on the true treasure that will one day be realized by God's people: his presence. This is the end of our salvation and God's objective in redemption, as summarized by Peter when he writes, "For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God..." (1 Peter 3:18, emphasis mine). What is intended to excite us in this chapter, what is intended to capture our imaginations and our affections, is not the beauty of a place, but the essence of that place as the full and unhindered dwelling place of God with his people. Every beautiful thing recorded in this chapter is intended to stir our hearts with the sure hope of one day abiding fully in the true blessedness of his holy presence. Oh, that our hearts would be stirred with a deep longing to experience his presence in this way!

How does this chapter in Revelation shape the way we understand our identity (for those who are in Christ)?

Why should this vision cause us to passionately pursue holiness? What is the connection between holiness and God's presence? In what ways should we pursue holiness individually? Corporately?
