Sermon Notes

Husbands, Love Your Wives as Christ Loved the Church

Ephesians 5:25-33 (pew Bible pgs. 978-979)

Biblical texts like Ephesians are a magnifying glass helping us more clearly see and better understand the culture around us, and the souls that live within that culture. "Darkness" is the word Paul uses to describe both the disposition and direction of this lost world. Those who are alienated from God are "darkened in their understanding" (4:18) and their lifestyle is characterized by "unfruitful works of darkness" (5:11). Ephesians helps us understand why the culture around us is the way it is.

The text we consider today is also a mirror that shows us all the flaws and blemishes in our character, the inconsistencies in our lifestyle and darkness of our hearts that are all too quickly revealed in marriage. And the Word we see is a scalpel, or sharp sword, that cuts "to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart." (Heb 4: 12-13) So, the words we see in Ephesians help us see and understand why we are the way we are.

Last week we were reminded that those who are in Christ have been "created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness". We who "at one time were darkness" are now "light in the Lord". (5:8) In our dark culture there is no better platform, no more odd and countercultural demonstration of this gospel light than Christian marriage. Christian marriage is a demonstration of the humble, submissive, self-sacrificing love of Christ. The Biblical model of marriage open up a window for the world to behold the beauty of the gospel. Today we look at the roles and responsibilities of husbands, who are called to "love your wives as Christ loved the church."
