### Sermon Notes

### Let Me Introduce You to the One True God

Acts 17:22-33

No one can understand the good news of Jesus until they understand they actually *need* the good news of Jesus. This was true in the culture of Paul's day, and it equally true in ours today. Athens was the hub of a pluralistic society with many gods, many philosophies, and many different competing worldviews. Some in Paul's day (like the Jews in the synagogue) had enough religious background to have a basic understanding of a Biblical worldview, but most did not.

A Biblical worldview is largely absent in our culture today. In areas such as understanding basic reality, human identity, morality, human history, ethics, ultimate human destiny..... none of these, according to current cultural understanding can be definitively established or defined. What can we say to these things? As disciples of the One who said he is "the way, the truth and the life" how are we to respond to a culture that says one way is as good as another, there is no definitive truth, and life has no value, origin or ultimate destination?

We find an answer in Acts 17. In this passage there is a comparison and collision of worldviews. Paul recognized that in order for the resurrection to be understood he needed to set the context. He introduces who God is, what he is like and the Christian view of history. It's only in the context of the Christian worldview that the gospel makes sense. No one will listen to or respond to the good news of a Savior until they understand their need. This is what Paul did in Athens. It is a good model for us today.

The introduction: (Acts 17:22-28)

God is the Creator of everything, Lord of heaven and earth

God is transcendent and self-sufficient, He needs nothing from us

God is Lord, the Sovereign over humanity and history

God is relational, wanting mankind to know and worship Him

The Instruction: (Acts 17:29-31)

The commonality of humanity and our common point of origin

The uniqueness of God and the rebellion of idolatry The patience of God and the command to repent The righteous judgment of the resurrected one

The Response: (Acts 17:32-33)

Some will mock Some will delay Some will believe

Just like Paul was able to use portions of the poetry from the Athenian culture to speak the gospel in a meaningful way, what are some elements of our own culture we could use in a similar way? How could these cultural elements offer opportunities for us to practice "gospeling" our world?
