The Promised King When There Was No King: An Overview of Judges

In those days there was no king in Israel. Everyone did what was right in his own eyes. Judges 21:25

The book of Judges, by anyone's standard, is R rated. Idolatry, death, deception, slaughter, human sacrifice and betrayal, illicit sex and scandal saturate the pages of this book. The reasons for this abysmal situation are many, but it is summarized with this statement: *In those days there was no king in Israel. Everyone did what was right in his own eyes. Judges 21:25*

The most shocking feature in the book of Judges, however, is not the abysmal sinful state of God's people, but the amazing grace and mercy of God. God's patience, compassion and steadfast covenant love shine against the dark backdrop of the Israel's sin. The work of the judges, as flawed as they are, is the means by which God repeatedly delivers his people, recalls his promise of a good king, and ultimately points us to the promised King - Jesus Christ.
