Sermon Notes

From Empty to Full, From Bitter to Blessed Ruth 4

This week, I read an article entitled *Welcome to 2030: Three visions of what the world could look like in ten years*. In making some predictions about what could happen in our world, factors such as pandemics, vaccines, science, technology, environment, economic developments, global strategies, and domestic issues are considered by the authors. In summary, things could get crazy (or crazier).

The story of Ruth reminds us that, no matter how crazy things seem, history is not a disjointed conglomeration of events and out-of-control circumstances. God has "a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth" (Ephesians 1:10). History is moving toward a new heaven and new earth with Jesus, "the root and the descendant of David, the bright morning star", seated on the throne.

Ruth begins with famine, brokenness, grief, and emptiness. It ends with plenty, restoration, joy, and fullness. It begins with a man who failed to live up to his name (Elimelech – 'My God is King') and ends with a man after God's own heart who would be God's promised king for Israel. From that king – David – would come the Eternal King of kings and Lord of lords.
