Sermon Notes

The Hound of Heaven Catches the King

2 Samuel 12 (pew Bible pgs. 263-264)

Fear knew not how to evade as Love knew only to pursue. Still with unhurrying chase, And unperturbed pace, Deliberate speed, majestic instancy, Came on the following Feet, And a Voice above their beat—'Naught shelters thee, who wilt not shelter in Me.'

Francis Thompson shares his own personal story in the poem *The Hound of Heaven (1890)*. Thompson studied to be a priest, but never finished. He studied medicine, but flunked out of medical school. He joined the military, but was let go after one day. Eventually he became an opium addict, was homeless and struggling to survive in the darkest parts of London. But he couldn't get away from God's persistent love for him.

The Hound Of Heaven is a beautiful poetic picture of the God who never gives up on his own. Our merciful God wills and works to ensure that nothing sustains us, nothing satisfies us, nothing shelters us when we are foolishly running and hiding from God.

While not to the extreme as we saw last week, every earth-bound disciple goes through the battle we saw in David's life - the battle he lost and lost badly – the battle against fleshly desires and the will to be autonomous. We also lose those battles, and we go through those times and seasons where God seems far away from us; where his grace is just a word from a song; where his mercy and love seem to be absent from our life – missing from our world.

In 2 Samuel 12, David is in one of those seasons. He is in that dark place where sin takes us. It is by God's grace that he is visited by Nathan and through that encounter comes to the realization of where he is away from God, of who he is as a sinner, and of who he is as God's beloved son. In a passage where David is sending men to fight, sending men to take another man's wife, sending to have that man killed, and sending to lie and cover up to hide the mess...God is the one who sees it all, declares his disdain for what he sees, and *sends* his prophet on a mission of mercy to save David from himself and his sin.
